

Tim Scott to lead January 21st Play Day!

Tim Scott was born in Brooklyn, New York on July 4th 1950. He attended the High School of Music and Art and enjoyed summers at Tanglewood, Meadowmount, and at master classes in Portugal. During this time, he studied cello with Maurice Eisenberg, with whom he continued to study while attending Juilliard School of Music and Sarah Lawrence College. Tim then became a rock musician and toured with Harry Chapin for two years! He recently retired from 41 years with the Oregon Symphony (he started with them in 1971!).

Tim has played viola da gamba since 1980, when he commenced his baroque cello and viola da gamba studies, the latter with Eva Heinitz and in master classes with Wieland Kujiken. Tim has performed with the Portland Baroque Orchestra, the Oregon Bach Festival and as

soloist in the Bach Passions. Tim is currently President of the newest chapter of the VdGSA—Cascadia Viols.

Joanna Blendulf Play Day Review

I volunteered to write a summary of the November 19th "play day" because I thought I'd be able to get my husband, Jeff, to write it, but he's making me do it!

We were very fortunate to have as presenter for this event, Joanna Blendulf, who was not only very instructive, but also wonderfully patient and enthusiastic. For a beginner, like myself, I thought she struck just the right balance in terms of offering basic advice along with more advanced technical instruction. The very first thing she brought up after observing us play (and hearing some harsh sounds), was the importance of playing with a relaxed bow arm and keeping your shoulder down. Furthermore, and I'm sure she was addressing me personally, she helped us understand that relaxing the whole body--especially the lower jaw--will go a long way toward improving our overall playing and sound.

Before lunch, Joanna worked with the entire ensemble on three short pieces. We began with a 4-part *In Nomine* by John Thorne--a composer new to most, if not all of us. For the dotted rhythm

that runs throughout the piece she suggested and demonstrated a specific bowing which she dubbed "Z bowing"--the idea being that there's very little uptake of the bow on the short note. (Jeff misheard her and spent the whole class wondering why she called it "D bowing".). Next, we worked on two wonderful song settings by Byrd: *In Fields Abroad* and *Why do I use my paper, ink and pen?*. The recurring upward leap in "Fields" prompted her advice to try to land on the upper note with a push bow (I hope I have that right--I was feeling a little muddle-headed about the bowing at that point since I had enough on my plate just finding the notes!). It was gratifying to hear the improvements in our reading of "Fields" after implementing her suggestions for dynamics and bowings.

After lunch, we divided into smaller groups. Joanna continued to work with those who opted to attend the coached session. First, we worked on a short joyful "fantasie" by another obscure composer, Lupus Episcopius. I think everyone particularly enjoyed playing this little gem. The last two pieces we tackled, *In Nomine nos. 6 & 7* by Alfonso Ferrabosco the younger, were much more difficult--particularly number 7 which was highly chromatic. Again, I'd say that Joanna struck the right balance in her choice of repertoire--this final piece provided a challenge to even the most advanced players.

Personally, I loved her choice of music and was thankful that I'd had a couple of days to look it over beforehand. I would again like to request that music be made available ahead of time (the sooner the better) for each play day event. If all your attention is given to finding the notes, you can't really benefit as much from the finer points of instruction. Ideally, we could relieve the presenters from the onerous task of bringing printed out music for everyone. This would require some planning ahead so that attending members know they're responsible for bringing their own parts.

Turnout for the event was very good and there were at least two new faces- including one youngster (i.e. under 18)! Could this be the beginning of a trend?
