Sarah Mead leads Play Day – Saturday, March 3rd

Sarah Mead teaches, performs, and proselytizes polyphony in the Boston area. The 2007 recipient of the Thomas Binkley Award from Early Music America, she is a professor at Brandeis University, where she directs vocal and historical instrument ensembles and teaches music history; she has also taught sixteenth-century theory and performance practice at the Longy School of Music. Her handbook on Renaissance theory is used in historical music programs around the country. Overseas she has performed and given master-classes, lectures, and workshops in Japan, Australia, New Zealand and the UK. She is former Music Director for Early Music Week at Pinewoods Camp, and serves on the Boards of the VdGSA and EMA. She is a founding member and music director of Nota Bene Viol Consort.



Sarah is calling this Play Day “Singing with your Bow”, and we are going to be exploring vocal pieces in four languages (English, French, German, and Italian) to see how the text can help us shape our phrases. The pieces she has chosen are an arrangement of “Blessed is he that fears the Lord” from Psalm 112 by William Byrd, an arrangement of Psalm 119 “Beati immaculate” by Paschal d’Estocart, “Maria wallt zum Heilgtum” (When Mary to the temple went) by Johann Eccard, and “Quando quell’empio”, one of fourteen spiritual soneti by Pietro Vinci that tells the story of Jesus’ sacrifice for man.

A report from our January 13th Play Day with Mary Springfels

Members who attended the Play Day presented by Mary Springfels had a great time working first through Josquin’s famous *Ave Maria* and then Ludwig Senfl’s elaborate tribute to the work. The comparison of these two beautiful works made us appreciate each of them more, and in a special way. Senfl draws out the text with repetition (of the words), which makes his work more than twice as long as Josquin’s, though his meter changes are in the same part of the text as the earlier work. Mary talked a bit about how the demands of counterpoint didn’t always allow the stressed syllables of the text to fall on strong beats. (She mentioned Adrian Willaert, a

Netherlandish composer of the Renaissance, as a leader in consistently aligning musical and verbal stresses.) She also talked a bit about musica ficta and noted that Senfl, being a more tonal composer than Josquin, raised fewer questions about leading tones. However, even in Josquin's music she feels that we need concern ourselves only at cadences, and that fussing with notes within phrases is unnecessary.

The morning session flew by so quickly that we all agreed to take up after lunch just where we'd left off before the break!

As our VdGSA Circuit Rider instructor, Mary also taught lessons and coached consorts the day before Play Day. I think we all felt that she was very interesting and very helpful, and that by the end of our sessions we were playing better, with better ensemble and with even more enthusiasm. Her discourse on the structure of the music made us want to have more variety in our sound, and we were ready and grateful for her specific suggestions on how to use the bow to that end. Mary was very encouraging and engaged, and I hope more members will take advantage of her gifts when she returns!

FYI: Mary recommended two online resources for early music and string players. Honeysuckle Music (<http://honeysucklemusic.com>) is an online music store where Mary says you can find anything! The other site Gabriela's Baroque (<http://www.gabrielasbaroque.com>), the online site of luthier Gabriela Guadalajara, which she recommends for ordering strings. I followed Mary's advice and contacted Gabriela's Baroque with the string length of my treble and received recommendations for which strings and gauges might sound better on my instrument. (We'll see how that goes!)

Board Member, Compose and Musician: Jon Brenner

Jon Brenner, has been a composer and musician for the past two decades. Recently he finished his most recent work: "Deploration Upon the Death of Lloyd Rodgers (Contrapunctus Ouroboros Mobius)". The piece is a three-and-a-half hour counterpoint cycle based on a cantus firmus. The piece took over a year to write and is in honor of Jon's late composition teacher.

Other recent pieces include his score for "Forest Song", a Ukrainian play which was produced last December on Bainbridge Island. His score features music for clavichord, recorder, and viola da gamba. It also contains four arias for cast members to sing. Based on the success of the run last December, "Forest Song" will hit the road for a performance in Portland in May, and another two-week run



in Seattle in July. Additionally, Jon can regularly be heard playing in pit orchestras for various musical theatre groups in the area, including the Lesser Known Players where he was recently appointed Resident Music Director. Needless to say, Jon has been up to his eyeballs in activities over the past year!


